Who we are

The Eaglehawk Community House (ECH) has been serving our community and beyond for nearly four decades, offering a unique and welcoming environment that is safe and inclusive. Programs aim to reduce isolation and loneliness by providing low-cost or no-cost social activities that encourage the development of self-help skills.

ECH takes a comprehensive approach to community involvement, welcoming people of all ages, abilities, religions, and cultures. ECH is also a disability-friendly facility, providing special access to those with limited mobility. Many people consider the Eaglehawk Community House their "home away from home," and take great pride in serving as a hub of connection and support for the community.

The Community House offers a variety of daily activities such as food and meal preparation, cooking, packaging, labelling, and storing items for distribution, hamper assembly, magazine development and distribution, gardening and grounds maintenance, craft activities, administration, cleaning, and emergency food relief.

In addition, the ECH offers assistance to citizens to receive the power-saving bonus and professional services such as free child car seat safety checks, financial counselling, psychology, and advocacy. Furthermore, external facilitators hold classes such as Tai Chi, yoga, meditation, basic computer learning, and singing sessions.

Chairperson Report

This has been another good year for Eaglehawk Community House. Among other things we participated in The Dahlia And Arts Festival and The Children's Festival. As well as being involved in multi cultural activities such as dinners. In July Tracey attended a Civic Reception at The Bendigo Art Gallery to welcome The Indian ambassador. As well the regular events such as The Community Lunches and Art classes continued with good attendances.

With the ever rising cost of living tho demand for food relief has continued to grow and each week several families depend on us to provide food for them. We thank Food Bank and FoodShare for helping us with the distribution of this food every week.

Other Community involvement included helping with The Winter Night Shelter and The Be Well Connected Expo. Also we provided assistance for people who needed help in claiming The Power Saving Electricity Bonus. We also continued with the Safe Seats program.

Improvements to the House included new ovens and a dishwasher. As well maintenance work was necessary to repair broken pipes and the leaky roof.



We are very grateful for the support we have received from Lisa Chester's and the City Council.

Finally I would like to thank all staff, volunteers and the other members of The Committee Of Management for their help and support during the year.

Centre Managers Report

I love this time of year when we share our achievements after another very productive and successful year.

Congratulations to all ECH connections – our community value report for 2023 registered more than -:

\$3,791 million dollars

equivalent in support and services to our citizens and community. This figure encompasses 35,332 connections for Community Lunch; Pantry Bingo; Food Assistance; Fruit Box families reaching out for fruit and vegetables; our Community Christmas Party; the Eaglehawk Children's Festival and of course approx. 2500 visitors to our newly titled 'Festival of Friendships' with our traditional Festival including food trucks, live entertainment, the little Ferris wheel for younger kids and other favourite inflatables and rides, art & craft market stalls, and great coffee all delivered in the event space of Canterbury Park Gardens.

And with the securing of funding largely through the Multicultural Events & Festivals Program we were able to build on this beautiful Festival developing a free multicultural community event sharing cultural foods, song, dance and music, cultural activities and stunning traditional dress. And with the weather being a glorious 26 degrees this year, there certainly was something for everyone at this year's Dahlia & Arts Festival. A very big thankyou to our Indian, Filipino, African, New Zealand, First Nations and Aussie partners for helping to make this event so successful.

Other highlights this past year include our ECH Community Christmas Party with funding secured through the COGB Community Christmas grants program. Together we worked with our partners Toyworld Bendigo, Southern Cross Network, the Eaglehawk CFA and we cannot thank them all enough for their generous support and assistance. Additionally, we collaborated with our sister Neighbourhood Houses in the Greater Bendigo region offering the same partnership with Bendigo Toyworld ensuring that through all our networks we could reach an even greater volume of families including children of all ages, seniors, people with disability and aiming to reach larger numbers from our marginalized communities including those new to Bendigo.

The ECH has continued to deliver our regular programs such as art and craft classes each week, meditation, gardening, Food Relief, Tai Chi, morning tea's and a weekly Community lunch. Our Teams have been very busy preparing produce, cooking, packaging and coordinating our Meals Program providing almost another 1000 home cooked, healthy meals home delivered to some of our most vulnerable citizens. This year, we are thankful to have such a strong partnership with the Kangaroo Flat Community House which has allowed us to offer pre-accredited Hospitality inc Barista training and Digital Literature Essentials and Work Ready classes to assist people to learn and/or improve on their knowledge and skills in this area. We have supported another twelve (12) Bendigo TAFE students to complete their Diploma in Community Service, assisting in moving them one step closer to their chosen careers and towards paid employment. And we are very thankful to have supported more than 1356 volunteers providing activities, friendly connection, sharing a meal, working together as a Team to deliver the much-needed programs we have to offer to our Community.

There is one very special partnership I would like to specifically mention and that is our growing connection with the Indian Association of Bendigo (IAB). We thank members of the IAB for supporting the ECH and our citizens throughout the Christmas and New Year period by volunteering

to deliver Food Assistance for those who need support and when it's needed the most. This enabled our hard working staff and volunteers to enjoy a much needed break during this time of year.

Our partnership has led to many special occasions over the past year including invitations to the spectacular Holi Festival, a Children's Diwali Mela Festival (or children's Christmas celebrations) delivered from the ECH connecting with around 300 visitors. And very privileged occasions such as afternoon tea with the consul General of India Dr Sushil Kumar. And our Festival of Friendships deserves a special mention again as it truly was a wonderful Festival connecting people with cultures.

Throughout 2023-24, we have also hosted the Victorian Multicultural Commission on two occasions for dinner and the Regional Advisory Committee (RAC) meetings and this commitment continuing into the latter part of 2024. Members of the RAC have commented that they feel so comfortable coming to the ECH. Mission accomplished..!!

We have worked closely with the Victorian Government and Jacinta Allan MP, partners, funders and other connections making a significant impact advocating with NHVic on behalf of Victoria's Houses who provide aid in the Food Relief space, assisting in securing \$2.5 million dollars in this current years State budget. We sincerely thank our partners Bendigo Foodshare and Foodbank Victoria for their ongoing support throughout the year

Further State and Federal Government collaborations include supporting the new Lisa Chesters MP advertising campaign being shown throughout the Bendigo Cinemas. We also welcomed Lisa and her crew for Community lunch last August. Additional media included Lisa's Volunteer Grants presentation and both Lisa's and Premier Jacinta's budget announcement's of support towards the cost of living crisis mid year.

We built on our partnership with NHVic again offering the Safe Seats Safe Kids program providing free car seat safety checks throughout the year and we were very busy with the launch of the next round of Power Saving Bonus funding available to households to assist with the cost of living crisis.

I was also very pleased to represent our region on the RANCH Committee for the past two years as President. This has been one of my most fulfilling roles to date and I was thrilled to be part of the subcommittee to appoint Kaz Williams to the role of Network Manager. There is also serious discussion considering adopting a 12 month pilot of the NHVic Network Management model to provide a greater level of support to the Network Manager role. This has added further stability to RANCH as an organization and I look very forward to witnessing the future now I have stepped down.

There has been more than usual reporting and governance requirements this past year with our Model Rules needing to be updated in line with new Consumer Affairs obligations for full compliance. Additionally, was the updating of the sector Enterprise Bargaining Agreement which the ECH has now adopted.



Our partnership with the City of Greater Bendigo continues to grow with connections through Yo Bendigo; attendance along with other Greater Bendigo Houses and RANCH at the 'Be Well Be Connected' Expo hosted by the City, along with Food Relief and Volunteering consultations, surveys and discussions. We also thank the COGB for awarding the ECH funding to purchase and install a brand new dishwasher, 2x ovens, washing machine and clothes dryer this year replacing appliances that had certainly provided many, many hours of hassle free usage, further assisting our community House and citizens by providing essential facilities that matter, when it matters.

At the RANCH Forum held on Tuesday 23rd April 2024 at the Capital Theatre, the Forum largely focused on Cultural Competency Awareness with a presentation by Loddon Campaspe Multicultural Services and networking opportunities with many likeminded organizations sharing their services and how they support their target groups.

And another very important project about to be launched is developing our new website through KGMG Creative Agency.

A huge congratulations to all connections of the Eaglehawk Community House.

I wish to sincerely thank all our incredible partners, valued volunteers for all your support, assistance and hard work throughout the year; our Committee of Management for your support at meetings and assisting with House activities and odd jobs to keep us functioning, safe and continuing the regular support our citizens deserve. I sincerely thank our key staff Rochelle, Sabine, Mel, Ally and Rose for all your great work – you truly are all a fabulous team and we would not be where we are without you. I sincerely thank you all and look very forward to a happy, calm and successful 2025.

Finance Report

Eaglehawk Community House (ECH) has been busy again this year – continuing to assist our community.

Department of Families, Fairness & Housing (DFFH) and City of Greater Bendigo (CoGB) continue to provide us with our main source of income, allowing us to support our community - providing us with 67% of our income for the 2023-24 year.

Approximately 13% of the funding provided to us from other organisations – with the other 20% of our income from House driven activities and donations.

ECH has recorded a loss this fiscal year, mostly due to not reaching our expected income, with grants being difficult to obtain.

We also joined up with the Portable Long Service Leave Authority scheme – which meant we had to provide them with payments backdating to July 2019, along with the current year payments – additional expenditure that hadn't been budgeted for.

Our continued food relief assistance continues to put a strain on our budget, with no incoming money to support this much needed community project - this program will be revised and amended during this financial year.

Our forecasted budget shows we will continue to improve financially in 2024/25, with some changes being made in regards to our Food programs to give us additional income - allowing us to continue delivering food, programs, activities and services to our community.

Our Balance Sheet shows we are continuing to build a strong financial standing, and the forecasted budget indicates that we will continue to improve and grow, putting us in a better financial position.

Since Eaglehawk Community House undertook the significant responsibility of organising the Dahlia & Arts Gala Fair—now rebranded as the Festival of Friendships—it has blossomed into one of the House's largest and most successful fundraising initiatives. The long-standing Dahlia & Arts Festival has consistently attracted visitors and families, becoming the most anticipated annual event on the Eaglehawk calendar. Traditionally, it draws in over 5,000 attendees, highlighting its prominence in the community.

This year's festival was particularly triumphant, benefiting from beautiful weather and notably higher visitor turnout throughout the day. We take immense pride in having collaborated with like-minded community groups and local businesses to bring this event to life for our community.

The 2024 Festival placed a strong emphasis on inclusion and diversity, welcoming various community and multicultural organisations and performers for the first time. This focus on promoting cross-cultural awareness created a positive ripple effect throughout the community, serving as a valuable platform for connection. It fostered engagement and strengthened community ties among all participants in this dynamic celebration.
